WPC INTERNET ISSUES

This past Sunday's live streamed worship service suffered from internet issues. We contacted Verizon on Monday and believe that the problem(s) can largely be corrected for next Sunday's service (May 9th).

POP-THE-TRUNK FOOD DRIVE SATURDAY, MAY 2ND



WPC found another creative way to serve Christ and community during these unprecedented times. Using the highly successful model of our drive-thru Palm Sunday cross distribution which drew national attention, a dozen or so masked and gloved WPC volunteers came together under the leadership of Elder Lenita Gullman to serve 68 families trying to make ends meet.

Community members rolled through the WPC parking lot, stopping to pop their trunks and having a WPC volunteer place 2 heavy bags of groceries in bright red paper shopping bags in the trunks of their vehicles.

Pastor Joe asked community members if they had prayer concerns and prayed with many of them through open car windows.

First, I hope this finds you all safe and well. I know the coronavirus has touched WPC very closely and personally. My prayers go all with those who have suffered illness and loss.

Secondly, I would like to thank all of you for your continued financial support of Westminster during this difficult time. Many of you have sent in your pledges and donations and we appreciate it so much!

I'd like to share with you how some of your gifts enable Westminster to continue its mission even in these dark and restricted times.

- The Palm Sunday cross give-away enabled many to continue a long and well-loved church tradition. The drive-thru distribution enabled those WPC members who were able to drive to the church to remember Palm Sunday in that special way and even drew people from other churches who wanted to honor Jesus. Our delivery to our vulnerable shut-ins brought smiles to many faces on that important Sunday.
- The Session acted quickly to enable Holy Communion to continue in a safe and correct social-distancing method by purchasing the all-in-one sealed Communion cups and distributing them with the palms.
- The technical skills of a few enabled all of the special Holy Week services to continue and to be brought directly into the homes of congregants, even as gathering together in the Sanctuary was prohibited.
- These same skills enabled Wednesday Night Live to morph into Wednesday Night Five to bring special words of comfort from our Pastor into our homes.
- In the same manner, our regular Sunday services and Holy Communion will continue forward during the restrictions of the pandemic.
- The Deacons Food Pantry remains open for those with needs.
- Our recent food drive and distribution touched many lives. The generosity of the congregation and the community enabled us to give two full bags of groceries plus fresh bread, fresh fruit, paper and cleaning products to 75+ families.
- The Deacons' Blood Drive will take place in May.
- The Session and Board of Deacons continue to reach out to and stay in contact with our most vulnerable.

So even as WPC seeks to tighten its belt and curtail expenses (a special thank you to Pastor Joe and Erika for leading our worship in an unheated sanctuary!), we are still looking for ways to be the body of Christ in the community and share the Good News of Gospel.

Again, Stewardship is about time and talent as well as treasure. Please continue to watch out for and help the most vulnerable. Shop for your elderly neighbors. If you have the skills, consider making masks, or knitting for our baby program. Spend some time in the scriptures. Make time to pray for all!

Also remember to take care of yourself: stay connected, stick to a daily schedule, do something you enjoy every day, wash your hands often and eat a healthy diet.
